Reimagines the early adulthood of a future 16th President from the alternating views of the two people who knew and loved him best, including spirited debutante Mary Todd and Lincoln's intimate confidante, Joshua Speed.
- A Bend in the Stars** Barenbaum, Rachel.
In World War II-era Russia, an ambitious young doctor and her scientist brother race against Einstein to solve one of the greatest mysteries of the universe.
- Mistress of the Ritz** Benjamin, Melanie.
The director of the luxurious Hotel Ritz in occupied Paris and his courageous American wife, Blanche Auzello, risk their marriage and lives to support the French Resistance during World War II.
- The Guest Book** Blake, Sarah.
The bereaved matriarch of a powerful early-20th-century American family makes a fateful decision that reverberates throughout two subsequent generations further impacted by racism, reversed circumstances and disturbing revelations.
- Resistance Women** Chiaverini, Jennifer.

A servant and former slave enduring a sensational trial for her employers' murders reflects on her Jamaican childhood and her apprenticeship under a debauched scientist whose questionable ethics set the stage for a forbidden affair.
- After the Party** Connolly, Cressida.
Moving into her sister's country house in 1938 England after years abroad, Phyllis becomes entangled in circle of idealistic new friends and their views about a charismatic new leader before a lapse in judgment changes the course of her life.
- The Daughter's Tale** Correa, Armando Lucas.
A tale of love and redemption based on the 1944 Oradour-Sur-Glane massacre follows an octogenarian's receipt of a cache of letters, written by her mother during World War II, that uncover decades of secrets.
- The Abolitionist's Daughter** McPhail, Diane C.
Things change for the Southern-abolitionist Mathews family when, on a Mississippi morning in 1859, Emily Matthews begs her father to save a slave, Nathan, about to be auctioned away from his family.
- The Song of the Jade Lily** Manning, Kirsty.
Returning to Australia to attend her grandfather's deathbed, a heartbroken woman learns the remarkable story of her grandmother, a Jewish refugee who forged a fateful friendship with a local in World War II Shanghai.
- The Yankee Widow** Miller, Linda Lael.
Protecting her child and Gettysburg farm at the height of the Civil War, a widow faces difficult choices when she offers shelter to a dedicated Union soldier, a passionate Southern rebel and a pregnant fugitive slave.
- The Flight Portfolio** Orringer, Julie.
The award-winning author of *The Invisible Bridge* presents a long-anticipated novel based on the story of Varian Fry's extraordinary effort to save the lives and work of Jewish artists fleeing the Holocaust.
- The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek** Richardson, Kim Michele.
A last-of-her-kind outcast and member of the Pack Horse Library Project braves the hardships of Kentucky's Great Depression and hostile community discrimination to bring the near-magical perspectives of books to her neighbors.

- Dawson's Fall** Robinson, Roxana.
Draws on the true Reconstruction experiences of the author's grandparents as recorded in family journals and letters, in a historical tale that finds a man in 1889 Charleston struggling to navigate his war-scarred country's evolving political, social and moral landscapes.
- Anna of Kleve, No. 4 (Six Tudor Queens)** Weir, Alison.
Arranged in a doomed marriage to England's infamous Henry VIII, a princess from a small German duchy hides a desperate secret in a hostile foreign court.

- Wild Card, No. 3 (Buddy Steel Mysteries)** Brandman, Michael.
When San Remo County Acting Sheriff Buddy Steel is deputized by the California Coastal Commission to investigate a reclusive Russian billionaire who has repeatedly violated state law by obstructing public access to his vast beachfront property, he makes a shocking discovery.
- Borrowed Time, No. 2 (Chicago Mysteries)** Clark, Tracy.
Cassandra Raines, a former Chicago cop turned private investigator, looks into a suspicious death as a favor to a friend—and makes some powerful enemies.
- Murder in Red, No. 49 (Murder, She Wrote)** Fletcher, Jessica & Land, Jon.
Investigating a private hospital for evidence of medical malpractice when a friend loses her life during a simple procedure, Jessica Fletcher makes unsettling discoveries that suggest her friend was a victim of something far more sinister.
